



*Danielle Faith Rose*

**July 19, 1951 - Sept. 27, 2017**

We are all God's children, but once in a while one is especially gifted. One that God has chosen to do his work with Him. To show courage and compassion in the face of what most people could not bear. To speak up and be heard so that others could be comforted. To let others know that they are not alone. Such a person was Danielle Faith Rose, originally from Jonas Ridge. Ms. Rose passed away peacefully on Wednesday, September 27th, surrounded by loved ones at Grace Heights Health and Rehab Center, after a 10 month battle with cancer. Danielle's bright and beautiful spirit touched and changed the lives of many people, and she will be remembered for her courage, her playful, happy spirit, and her desire to educate others about what it means to be transgendered.

Danielle, who was born Daniel Boyd Rose on July 19th, 1951, was the beloved child of Eva Rose Carpenter, who preceded her in death. She was also preceded in death by two brothers, Johnny Ray Rose and Larry Joe Rose, and by a dear Aunt, Mrs. Elsie Clark. For the first fifty years of life, she lived as Daniel. Although she knew from age four that her physical body did not match how she felt on the inside, she lived in fear of telling anyone the truth. Daniel attended Avery County High School and worked for many years at Baxter Travenol in North Cove, N.C. However, after experiencing a serious illness at age 50, she decided that she must live her truth and help others to understand that gender identity is about how our brains are wired and not about how our physical bodies appear. It is beyond most of our imaginations to understand the

courage it takes to live your truth when most of the world does not understand or approve. But Danielle would not allow other's treatment of her to define her and she never offered anything but love and understanding in return.

Danielle was diagnosed with Stage 4 cancer in December of 2016; however, instead

of feeling sorry for herself and thinking about how her life would be impacted, she began thinking about all of the other people struggling to make the decision to begin the journey she had started at age 50. From a hospital room at Wake Forest Baptist Center, the night before she was scheduled for surgery to remove a brain tumor, she dictated a post to be published on Facebook and in her local paper. In it, she spoke of the judgment and bullying and cruelty she had experienced and she asked for understanding and acceptance for all people, regardless of gender or orientation. In addition, she asked forgiveness from anyone she might have hurt in her life.

Afterwards, even while undergoing radiation and chemotherapy, her mission became to spread the word that we are all God's children and that we are all loved. In February, the Morganton News Herald featured an article on her called "Being Human" and afterwards dozens of people in the community and beyond reached out to her to thank her for her courage and to seek support for their own journeys.

From wearing a tiara and evening gown to a chemotherapy treatment to giving a rose on Valentine's Day to everyone who worked with her at Grace Heights, Danielle brought a sense of fun and generosity to everything she did. She loved to make people laugh and her smile brightened all of our lives. Her selfless humanity and her unconditional acceptance and love of everyone around her was an amazing, inspiring legacy. She leaves this world a kinder, more loving place.

Left to cherish her memory are her sister, Debra Rose and husband, Larry Cole of Morganton; sister-in-law, Audrey Townsend Rose; and a host of cousins and friends who knew and loved her as Daniel and as Danielle. She was especially close to her cousins, Roger and Betty Clark of Jonas Ridge, Jason Clark and girlfriend, Kris Rice, Jennifer Allen and family, Ashley Sanchez, Olivia Sanchez Torres, and Bonnie Burse Buchanan. Last, but most certainly not least, she leaves behind her precious fur babies– Sassy, Little Bit and Baby, who were her constant companions for many years.
