Timothy "Tim" J. Quilty, 77, of Morganton, NC, and formerly of Warwick, RI, passed away Thursday, January 8, 2026.

Born in Providence, Rhode Island on September 19, 1948, he was the son of the late George F. Quilty and Christina A. Walsh Quilty.
